

## **Board of Directors Meeting Minutes February 14, 1999**

The Board of Directors meeting was called to order at 8:30 a.m. by President Del Wallis. Those present were Del Wallis - President, Fred Coleman - Secretary, Richard Bonner, Treasurer, Deena Hague, Greg Brown, Robert Snell and Ron Hawke. Absent were Jim Morrison and Gene Reed, excused. Also present was Randy Tolbert, Park Manager.

**MINUTES** - Motion by Hawke, second by Hague, to approve the minutes of the January meeting as mailed. Motion carried and so ordered.

#### MEMBERS BEFORE THE BOARD - None.

**CORRESPONDENCE** - Alameda Counsel #22, Boy Scouts of America -- certificate of insurance.

Door King--Information about electronic data transmission. Department of Health services -- New drinking water regulations concerning MTBE.

Notice of new property owners in the park -- Michael and Tresa Ford; Cynthia A Kasper; and Michael Rainwater. Letter that Moyle Excavation has acquired T.C. Striping. U.S. Forest Service -- to reforest 5500 acres near our land. Information from California Regional Water Quality Control Board and Department of Health Services.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

WATER - Morrison (absent) - Water usage last month was 620,000 gallons. Water leak on Jordan Way East. Frozen ball valve, Park valve. Lost about 90,000 gallons. There is one well left to close. Need to fix electrical work on Well #5. We still need a fence around other tanks. Work has been done on various well houses.

**ROADS - Reed (absent) -** Reed to have numbers for road work for 1999 at the next meeting.

BUILDINGS - Hawke - Everything okay.

**TIMBER -Coleman -** Information from forester Craig Tolmie:

- 1. Trying to contact Frank Walter about survey of property near the Boy Scout Camp for 1999 harvest.
- 2. He also checked boundaries with forest service concerning exchange of a few years ago, to make sure we are within our boundaries for harvest.
- 3. Estimate for harvest in compartment #2.

- 4. Reminder that \$2000 cost to use forest service road for the 1999 harvest.
- 5. Estimate for harvest in compartment #4.
- 6. Bids for 1999 harvest. Only two came in. Joe Martin Trucking, Sonora, CA. and Randy Gray, Sonora, CA. It was recommended by Craig that we go with Randy Gray due to his bid.
- 7. Information from Craig for each Board member concerning several recommendations for the management of our timber for the next 15-20 years. Needs to be read and any questions noted. Craig will attend the next meeting to answer questions, explain report, and get direction from the Board.

**RECREATION - Snell** - Corn beef and cabbage dinner will be March 13, 1999, at 6:00 p.m. at the recreation hall. **HEALTH AND SAFETY - Hague** The cover and fence have been placed around dumpster.

**EQUIPMENT - Brown -** Repaired chains and repaired blade on plow.

**FINANCE - Bonner -** Bills this month were 11,814.11; \$3,650.00 of this was for insurance. Motion by Snell, Second by Coleman to pay all bills. Motion carried and so ordered.

We will not have bills ready for April due to early meeting. Not all bills will have been received by the time of the board meeting.

**CARETAKERS REPORT -** Randy submitted a summary of all jobs completed and in progress this month.

**OLD BUSINESS** - Discussion on whether to award a bid or reject all bids on the timber sale approved by the membership at the 1997 General Meeting. Motion by Brown, Second by Bonner, to accept bid by Randy Gray. Motion carried and so ordered.

Reminder that the April Board of Directors Meeting will be held Saturday April 3, 1999, at 1:00 p.m. It is important that all Board members be in attendance at this meeting.

**NEW BUSINESS** - No new business.

Meeting closed at 1:00 a.m. by Del Wallis.
