

Spring Cleanup

It is that time of year to clear you lots and rooftops of all pine needles, branches, and other fire hazards. We are required to clear 30 feet around our cabins. The California Department of Forestry will begin inspection of lots beginning June 1. They will fine those owners whose lots are not in compliance with these standards. Please do not burn your pine needles and branches on your own lot. They can be hauled to the burn area on the west side of the meadow where there is no danger of catching trees on fire. Also be aware that fire permits are required for any fire on your own lot. Again, for the safety of our forest and our beautiful park, we request that you not burn on your own lot.

MINUTES - Motion by Coleman, second by Bonner, to approve the minutes of the February meeting as mailed with one correction; Greg Brown's absence was excused. Motion carried and so ordered.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

WATER - Morrison (absent) - Randy stated that water usage was 481,100 gallons in the last two months. We have received no response back from Bell Fencing. Randy to check on other fencing contractors. Randy and Mike might just buy the materials and do it themselves. This is for the five water tanks off David. We are rewiring well #5 to bring it up to code. Discussion about a generator for the water system. Could get one from Groveland water district, diesel, for about \$1800.00. Needs to be three-phase. This was brought up for information only. Need to check into this.

ROADS - Reed (absent) - Randy stated that there is a problem on Jordan Way East, just past the bridge. The road is not in good shape, cracking in several spots. Reed is to be contacted.

BUILDINGS - Hawke (absent) - No report.

TIMBER -Coleman - Timber cut has been approved by the state. The membership granted permission to do this cut in May 1997. Craig (our forester) had questions about his presentation for the May 1999 General Meeting.

Request from Randy Gray to winch logs from

withing the Equipment Exclusion Zone along Sugar Pine Creek up to the skid trails on weekends. Needs special authorization since he cannot work on weekends per our contract. This would involve the southwest end of the park on the south side of Sugar Pine Creed, up behind the Boy Scout Camp. Motion by Bonner, Second by Brown to allow only this weekend work. Motion carried and so ordered.

RECREATION - Snell (absent) - Fish are being purchased for the Father's Day Fish Derby.

HEALTH AND SAFETY - Hague - Mike cut his leg with a chain saw. We need an accident review - how it could have been prevented and what we have done. Committee to talk to Randy and Mike.

Please be careful with BBQ and other fires - Summer is approaching.

Lots need to be cleaned by the end of May. CDF to inspect lots starting June 1.

EQUIPMENT - Brown - New chains on the chain saws. Snow plow wiper blade arm has a problem which will be repaired this summer for next snow season. Problem with the park truck. It is not running now. Possibly the fuel pump. If it is the computer board, then we will have to take it in and put it on a machine. Will tow it to Zaks to have it checked out.

FINANCE - Bonner - Bills this month were 25,088.59. Motion by Hague, second by Brown to pay all bills. Motion carried and so ordered. Motion by Bonner, second by Hague to pay back the water fund \$5,700.00, for money taken out. Motion carried and so ordered. Thanks from Bonner to the Board for watching the budget the last couple of months.

CARETAKERS REPORT - Randy submitted a summary of all jobs completed and in progress this month.

OLD BUSINESS -

Property owners need to watch for dead and dying trees.

May 30, is our General Meeting. If you cannot attend, send your proxy. Meeting starts at 9:00 a.m. We will start signing people in at 8:00 a.m. We will start at 9:00 a.m. or as soon as we have a quorum after 9:00 a.m. We need a quorum for a meeting and we need you in attendance because of our future plans, which you need to be a part of.
